District Administrator's Report Dr. Penny Boileau

As we close out February, our regular winter season of sports comes to an end and tournament March madness begins. I would like to recognize and thank all our wrestling and basketball athletes for respectfully representing our school. The effort of all our athletes is appreciated and I would also like to say THANK YOU to our coaches for the long days, late nights, and family time they sacrifice to work with our teams. We have enjoyed many victories this season and we have also watched our athletes grow in other areas by participating in sports. They have developed friendships, team work, achieved individual and team growth, and experienced the commitment needed for a successful season. This is also true for members of other clubs and activities such as our play, music events, FBLA, forensics, Quiz Bowl, and Student Council among others. Being a small school district, our students are fortunate to be able to participate in many sports and activities. Thanks to supportive parents and dedicated staff leaders, our students engaged in these opportunities become well rounded individuals.

There are many activities to keep us busy, but we still keep our focus on academics. Encourage your children to stay on top of homework and put in the effort to be successful with their classes. March begins testing season and we strive toward proficiency. Part of reaching proficiency is practice at home. The National Education Association's signature program, Read Across America, is in its 20th year. It came in to existence to address the need for higher achievement in reading across our nation. Of all the children in the U.S., 34% of children entering kindergarten lack the basic skills needed to learn how to read, 63% of 4th graders read below grade level, which contributes to 7,000 students dropping out of high school every day, and only 37% of students graduating from high school are demonstrating proficient skills in reading. The focus of this highly recognized program is to motivate children and teens to read, read, read. The best way to improve reading skills is to spend more time reading. Research proves that reading 20 minutes every night helps students steadily improve and maintain reading skills. Let's all do our part to keep Almond-Bancroft students learning and moving toward high levels of academic achievement.

Speaking of high levels of academic achievement, watch for summer school details and registration information. We are preparing a fun, active program to include keeping sharp with literacy and math skills. Please sign up your children to join us and prevent the summer slide!

Pre-Kindergarten Programming
Informational Meeting
March 9, 2020
6:30 P.M.
A-B Secondary Library

In order to increase academic consistency for our Pre-Kindergarten students, the Almond-Bancroft School District is currently looking into changing the Pre-Kindergarten program. However, we are seeking parental and community input before any decisions are made.

PROPOSED PROGRAMMING – 4 Half Days: Students would attend Monday **through** Thursday, with one group attending in the mornings and one group attending in the afternoons (exact times to be determined). Bussing would continue to be offered to all students for both morning pick-up and afternoon drop-off; however, **mid-day bussing would NOT be offered**. Parents would either have the option to pick-up/drop-off their child at that mid-day transition time OR take advantage of an Extended Learning Center (ELC), free of charge, housed within the school building. If using the ELC option, Pre-Kindergarten students would be in the building the same times as K-12 students, but their time would be split between the Pre-Kindergarten Classroom and an Extended Learning Center. Furthermore, bussing would be available to them for the morning pick-up and afternoon drop-off times, with the other students. Fridays would continue to be a non-student day, however the ELC may or may not be available.

*With this change in programming, students would CONTINUE to follow the District calendar; they would not attend class or ELC on “No School” days. Additionally, there would be no class or ELC during breaks, including summer.

*The District’s goal would be to offer the ELC at no cost to resident families. However, there would continue to be a cost for meals if students eat breakfast, lunch, and snack each day. The meals would be provided through the School Meal Program.

**More specific details of the Extended Learning Center will be developed if the Pre-Kindergarten programming changes take place. The A-B School District will inform families of those details.

Middle School Students Recognizing Activists

A few of our middle school students wrote articles about activists that stand up for children's rights after studying and reading about these amazing people. They wrote about Kesz Valdez, who works to decrease child homelessness; Malala Yousafai, who advocates for girls' education; and James Kofi Annan, who helps release child slaves. Here are a few samples of their writing.



Chris Kesz Valdez Lilly Pratt

Kesz Valdez is a strong advocate for homeless children because he was homeless himself in the Philippines. He helped many children internationally by starting an organization to help those children that he believed needed help. He became a courageous activist for children's rights.

Kesz was a homeless person by the age of 4. He lived in the garbage. He had no shelter. He knew that what he went through was not easy, and he was rescued. So he did something about it, and helped those children that are homeless. He

didn't have many friends or family. He was just homeless all by himself on the side of the streets.

He started an organization called Championing Community Children. He helped more than 10,000 homeless children. He asked his adoptive family and others to help him with this cause. He wanted to change their life and help the homeless children.

He won the International Children's Peace Prize for his work with homeless children. He earned this award from his work in helping the children.

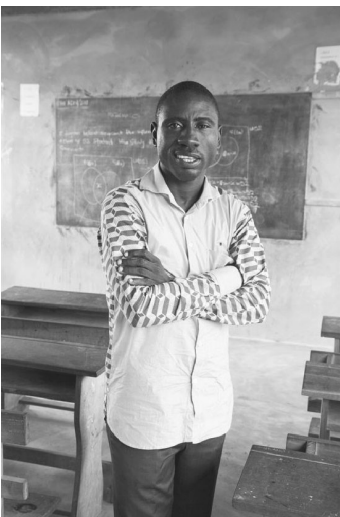


Malala Evan Stuczynski

Malala is a strong advocate for girls' education because she didn't get education when she was younger, just because she was a girl. She also values education for girls and she gives speeches today all around the world.

She could not get education when she was younger because the Taliban shut all girls' schools down. She supported education for girls by speaking out and trying to get the government to shut down the Taliban. Sadly she got shot by the Taliban, she was in deep pain and almost died, but she would not give up.

She did not give up on fighting for education. She continues to help girls, and today she still gives speeches. She won the Nobel Peace Prize 2014.



James Kofi Annan Jon Takacs

James is a strong advocate for helping child slaves because he was a slave himself. James has been nominated to be the World's Children Peace Prize Decade Child Rights Hero in 2020. He won this award for his work to fight against child slavery in the fishing industry on Lake Volta in Ghana.

He had a very difficult life. His life was hard because he was a slave and worked on a boat. He was a fishing slave for seven years doing hard work. While on the boat he could go hungry all day. James was not treated well.

Today he is helping children get out of slavery. James has the Challenging Heights Charity. This charity helps children learn.

He has won eight awards for helping children get out of slavery everyday. He managed to escape and get an education later to become a bank manager. Six years ago he left the bank and began helping other slaves.

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Phonological Awareness

What Is Phonological Awareness?

Phonological awareness is the ability to hear and identify the various sounds in spoken words.

Kids who have strong phonological awareness can do things like rhyme, count syllables, and blend sounds into words. Strong phonological awareness helps kids learn to read much more easily.

Phonological awareness develops gradually over time. Kids start with the easiest skills—understanding that spoken language contains words—and then move on to skills like rhyming. Eventually they develop the more advanced skills such as manipulating sounds.



Quick Check for Phonological Awareness

- Your child is able to rhyme. If you say the word *bat*, your child can respond with a rhyming word like *hat*.
- Your child understands word boundaries. If you say the sentence *Don't let the cat out*, your child is able to separate the sentence into five individual words.
- Your child can clap syllables. If you say *dog*, your child knows to clap once. If you say *umbrella*, your child knows to clap three times.
- Your child can blend sounds to make a word. If you say the sounds *sh...eep*, your child can say the word *sheep*.
- Your child can identify the beginning sound in a word. If you ask your child to say the first sound in *pig*, he will be able to respond with the sound /p/.
- Your child can identify the ending sound in a word. If you ask him to say the last sound in the word *jam*, your child is able to respond with the sound /m/.




