Notes from the Administrator....

Almond-Bancroft Operational Referendum How would referendum funds be used? By Superintendent Rich Hanson

There is no question, the \$525,000 annual recurring referendum the District is asking voters to approve on April 3 is a lot of money. That amount demonstrates the number of needs we have delayed over the past number of years that we now need to address.

If the referendum passes, the funds would be used for four major areas. Those areas are:

- Curriculum and Instruction (\$100,000 per year)
- Technology (\$75,000 per year)
- Teacher Retainment and Recruitment (\$200,000 \$300,000 per year)
- Facility and Equipment Maintenance. (\$100,000 per year)

The amounts are estimates at this time, but are serving as a guide for the amounts we would be dedicating to the particular areas.

Additionally, we need to address rebuilding our Fund Balance that has gotten dangerously low. The Fund Balance is reserve money used to pay expenses so we don't have to borrow funds while waiting for tax revenue and state and federal aid. The Fund Balance is currently at only about \$673,000. For a school district our size, it should be closer to \$1,500,000. About five years ago, we were at \$1,400,000, but we have had to dip into the fund balance to meet our financial obligations. Depleting our fund balance is a practice we cannot continue.

Curriculum and Instruction: The funds for curriculum and instruction will not only address updating our current curriculum, but will allow us to develop courses our students want and need as we prepare them for post-graduation. Many of our textbooks are outdated (10+ years old) and need to be replaced. Today, many textbooks have been replaced with online subscriptions that have current information, but also have a cost to maintain. We also need to continue to keep our teachers current in their instructional practices. Improving our instruction requires funds for professional development for our teachers.

Technology: We are reaching the end of our five-year technology referendum. The 2013 referendum provided us with a good start to begin updating our computers and hardware. That work is not complete, and as I am sure you know, technology is ever changing. Equipment we bought five years ago is wearing out and becoming obsolete.

Teacher Retainment and Recruitment: Teacher retainment and recruitment is a major issue we need to address and is a part of our plan. With the shortage of teachers experienced nationally and across the state, teachers are simply taking the jobs that pay better. In our case, a beginning teacher's salary is approximately \$5,000 - \$6,000 a year behind surrounding school districts such as Stevens Point, Pittsville, and Tomorrow River. Overall, we rank 10th out of 12 nearby area districts when we compare our base pay to that of other districts in the area. Our compensation continues to fall behind as we add years of experience and lands us 11th out of 12 when we look at the higher end of our pay scale.

Facility and Equipment Maintenance: As I am sure you know upkeep of our facility and equipment is an ongoing need. We have a number of maintenance and equipment needs that we have been postponing and we need to address. Those items include:

- Updating our outdoor security lighting
- Replacing our outdated security camera system

- Replacing our outdated and inefficient bathroom fixtures
- Boiler maintenance
- Replacing the school van, maintenance truck, riding lawnmower, and floor cleaning machine
- We also need to begin to prepare to repave our parking lots and about 25% of our roof in the next 5-7 years.

As you can see, we have many areas we need to address. We believe this is the most opportune time to ask voters to approve this \$525,000 referendum for recurring operational expenses on April 3.

We are retiring our 1998 building addition and the 2013 technology referendum at the end of the school year. That means we can provide the needed funds with no school tax rate increase.


Daren Anderson has earned the honor of Student of the Week because of the hard work and dedication he shows in and outside of band class. Daren

Oven-Baked Almond Fish Sticks Recipe courtesy of Kerri Glassman

1 cup crushed almonds

1/2 cup crushed bran flakes cereal

1 tablespoon wheat germ

1 teaspoon sea salt

1/2 teaspoon garlic powder

1/2 teaspoon cayenne pepper

1/2 teaspoon oregano

2 large eggs

2 teaspoons olive oil

1 pound cod, rinsed and cut into 1-inch by 5- inch pieces

Prepared marina sauce, for serving

Directions

Preheat the oven to 425 degrees F. Mix the almonds, bran flakes, wheat germ, sea salt, garlic powder, cayenne pepper and oregano together in a medium bowl. Crack the eggs into a separate small bowl and beat until frothy. Coat a baking pan with the olive oil. Dip the fish sticks first in the egg mixture, and then into the almond mixture. Place the fish sticks on the prepared pan. Bake until lightly browned, 10 to 15 minutes. Serve with your favorite marinara sauce as a dip. Serves 4.

VOTING BY ABSENTEE BALLOT ALMOND-BANCROFT PUBLIC SCHOOLS

April 3, 2018

Any qualified elector who is unable or unwilling to appear at the polling place on Election Day may request to vote an absentee ballot. A qualified elector is any U.S. citizen, who will be 18 years of age or older on Election Day, who has resided in the ward or municipality where he or she wishes to vote for at least 10 days before the election. The elector must also be registered in order to receive an absentee ballot. Proof of identification must be provided before an absentee ballot may be issued.

YOU MUST MAKE A REQUEST FOR AN ABSENTEE BALLOT IN WRITING.

Contact your municipal clerk and request that an application for an absentee ballot be sent to you for the primary or election or both. You may also request an absentee ballot by letter. Your written request must list your voting address within the municipality where you wish to vote, the address where the absentee ballot should be sent, if different, and your signature. You may make application for an absentee ballot by mail, in person or email if an email address if provided.

MAKING APPLICATION TO RECEIVE AN ABSENTEE BALLOT BY MAIL

The deadline for making application to receive an absentee ballot by mail is: 5:00 p.m., on THURSDAY, March 29, 2018.

Special absentee voting application provisions apply to electors who are indefinitely confined to home or a care facility, in the military, hospitalized, or serving as a sequestered juror. If this applies to you, contact the municipal clerk regarding deadlines for requesting and submitting an absentee ballot.

VOTING AN ABSENTEE BALLOT IN PERSON

You may also request and vote an absentee ballot in the clerk's office or other specified location during the days and hours specified for casting an absentee ballot in person. Where in person absentee voting is available only by appointment, all voting must be scheduled and occur between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m.
